

As we approach the end of another turbulent year in Haiti, it is only by the grace of God that we have remained steadfast despite many moments of distress, fear and even despair. Gang violence, food and gas shortages, dangerous travel and near constant instability forced us to move our school to another temporary location. In fact, many families fled the area after homes were burned, lives threatened, and livelihoods destroyed.

As one of the very few missions that have stayed to work in Haiti, we have welcomed students from other schools into ours, continued to purchase and distribute food, and supported several of our former students and orphanage kids with business grants and college and vocational training.

Though we face severe budget deficits, we have prayerfully chosen to move ahead with what we believe God has called us to do: share the love of Jesus through providing education, food, and other resources, trusting God to multiply what is sacrificially given. Because of your prayers and support, here are just a few of the challenges met by the House of Hope this year so far:





- Operated our K-13 school and supported two mountain schools, offering free or almost free Christian education to hundreds of students, and books, uniforms, shoes and tuition costs to over 90 scholarship students
- Provided tuition, books, uniforms and supplies to former orphanage students and funded 12 graduates to attend college/vocational school or to start businesses.
- Purchased and distributed almost \$30,000 worth of food to needy families.
- Built our third spring box water collection system in the mountains.
- Provided housing assistance to families displaced by violence.
- Shared the gospel of Jesus Christ through words and actions!
